## Minutes of the Annual Parochial Church Council held in the Church on Thursday 22nd March 2007

Chair: Ven Trevor Reader, Archdeacon of Portsmouth.

1. The archdeacon opened the meeting with prayers. Revd. Sandy Phillips read Phillipians ch.2
2. **Apologies** were received from Reg Taylor, Martin Baggs, Jenny Whiteside, John & Maureen Entiknapp, Brenda and John Hadley, Trevor Filtness, Nikki Marriott, Cyril and Peggy Charlesworth, Emma Dove, Richard Brown Nicola Olway, Rita Drake, Peter Gill, Ismay Doughty, Isobel Oakshott, Irene and Godfrey Joly, Fiona Wheatley, Julia Minchin, John and Joan Wild, Molly Ayling, Dave Fowler, Harry Horn. 59 parishioners were present.
3. **Election of Church wardens.** Sylvia Fisher and Rosemary Filtness were re-elected. They were thanked for all their hard work during a difficult and challenging time - due to the ongoing health problems of our vicar.

At this stage in the proceedings the archdeacon asked that his Chairman's Report be brought forward.

12. **Chairman's Report.** The Archdeacon said that the parish had been through a very difficult time. We had been assisted during this interim period by Revd. Stuart Cleaver, Revd. Ray Chapman, and Revd. Charles Keay. Revd. Paul Norton is now to retire on health grounds as from 31<sup>st</sup> march 2007. He will reside in the vicarage for three months until he can find alternative accommodation. The bishop has agreed to fill the post as soon as possible. There is to be a PCC meeting on 2<sup>nd</sup> April which the archdeacon and Simeon's trustee will attend. An NSM will help out for a while during the interim. PCC can advertise for an incumbent. This could cost £440. Alternatively we could ask Simeon's Trustees to supply one as they are our patron. The bishop can suggest names to the trustees and the diocese will pay all fees during this sequestration. Thanks to the archdeacon for all his time and trouble on our behalf.
4. **Confirmation of minutes of 2006 APCM.** These were passed as correct and signed by the archdeacon.
5. **Matters Arising.** There were none
6. **The Electoral Roll.** Jenny Whiteside, the Electoral Roll Officer, stated that every six years we are required to renew the electoral roll. There were 176 members on the old roll - now we have 155 on the new roll. 71 live outside the parish boundary and 84 within the boundary. Thanks to jenny for all her work in compiling the new electoral roll.
7. **The Parish Year Book.** Sylvia fisher said that the parish was "bruised but not broken". This year had been another hard slog for all of us, and a hard decision for the PCC was to put the Portsdown Parish Centre on hold. Thanks were extended to Sheila gill, Jim Molloy and all their team for their hard work and dedication. Also a big thank you to sandy Phillips and Cynthia whittle for their parish work. Our outreach and pastoral care had been tremendous and very rewarding. Congratulations to Sheila king on her appointment as diocesan president of the Mothers Union. Sylvia fisher and rosemary Filtness look forward, along with the entire congregation, to welcoming a new vicar in the not too distant future. Thanks were given to all those who took part in producing the year book.
8. **Financial report and audited accounts.** Numbers and giving are down by £1000. Our quota is up 6% ie £3779.09 every month. Increased giving is desperately needed and economic use of our facilities. Can quote be reduced to help us? Brian is to attend a deanery finance

committee meeting when he will have his say. Colin dove then stated that we need £35000 to repair the church roof, and gave a brief history of where our money went in the past - mainly to build a much needed church at Crookhorn

- a. Proposed by Nigel Wheatley that we accept the accounts for 2006, seconded by Ann Davies. Unanimously agreed. Thanks were expressed for the excellent presentation of the accounts. Brian Mansbridge stated that as from the 2008 APCM he will be retiring - so we will soon need a new treasurer.
- b. To appoint an independent examiner. Roy west retired last year from this post but was persuaded by the treasurer to examine the financial report. Roy west congratulated the money counters. The meeting was asked if there was anyone willing to take on this post. David Davies offered his services and was elected.

**9. Election of the PCC.** There are vacancies for PCC representatives. Ann Dove(Secretary), Graham Olway and Ismay Doughty finished their term of office.

**14. Website:** A presentation was given by Nigel Wheatley on the Christ Church Website.

Enquiries come from all around the globe - mainly seeking burials plots of relatives.

Photographs can be put on the website of various activities but permission must be sought from those being photographed. The website is a good method of communication.

Sidespersons can look up their duty on the rota; people can find out what is on at the hall; and who is running events and activities. There is a map of the churchyard on the website and in the parish office.

**15. Closing Prayer.** The meeting closed at 2130 hours with the Grace. The archdeacon said that we look forward with hope and joy to the coming year.

## Report on Financial Stewardship and Gift Aid 2007

It is very helpful if you can either pledge a weekly sum or commit to a regular standing order through your bank. Thank you to the many of you (around 100) who have made such a commitment, enabling us to plan our expenditure against an anticipated income. Please remember that inflation has the effect of eroding the value of our giving, so we should all review our pledges and standing orders each year.

If you are a UK taxpayer, you can gift aid this money. We can then claim back the tax from the Inland Revenue, effectively enhancing your gift by (currently) £2.82 for every £10.00, at no additional cost to yourself. Please see me for a gift aid declaration form, and we will do the rest. Even if you do not want to commit to a regular payment, you can still gift aid your giving, enabling us to claim back the tax every time you make a donation using one of our envelopes. If you are a higher rate taxpayer and make a note of your donations on your tax return, you will have the additional benefit of a refund yourself. Please see me if you require details of your donations for this purpose.

I know that some of you do not gift aid your donations because you feel that the tax you pay is insufficient to cover this (particularly if you have retired from work). If this is the case, you can obtain a statement from the Inland Revenue at the end of each financial year (after 5th April) advising you how much tax you paid. If you then advise me, I can ensure that the money you paid in tax is transferred through the gift aid scheme to help support our church.

Based on the donations made in 2007, we have submitted claims to the Inland Revenue for £10,732. This is a significant element of income for the church, and it does represent an encouraging 14% increase from 2006. As this is all "free money", I urge you to sign up if you are tax payers. I would be delighted to talk to you about the gift aid scheme or the envelope scheme. ## **Traidcraft and Fair Trade**

Traidcraft was established in 1979 as a Christian response to poverty. It seeks to transform the lives of producers in the developing world by encouraging them to use their skills and resources to trade their way out of poverty. It challenges injustices in trading and guarantees fairer trading practices, extra income for community development, safer working conditions and generates greater respect for the environment.

During the past year we have continued to support this effort and have also contributed comments and criticisms (along with other churches) at the annual general meeting in Durham. This has resulted in changes to the quality of some goods, particularly coffee and ginger cookies, and better parity in the prices offered by supermarkets. We have also managed to overcome the difficulties in obtaining some supplies.

Our turnover has not been quite as high as in previous years (approximately £1250 between January and December) but has picked up considerably in the past three months.

## Guiding at Christ Church

The Guide unit also undertook a variety of projects that have included: Guide camp at Meonwood, winter weekend at HQ and participation in the 'Go Green' project. Five girls have obtained the highest Award in Guiding - The Baden Powell Challenge. They will be presented with the Award on the 26<sup>th</sup> March on board HMS Victory. Well done to Alice, Lindsay, Beth, Harriet and Hannah. Four Guides were lucky enough to take part in a five-day environment project in the New Forest, this included gaining skills such as hedge laying and path-making.

The Senior Section unit (for girls 14 plus) is growing. There are seven members, all undertaking the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. Laura and Angela completed their Bronze award at the end of last year and have just started the Gold. Others are starting their Bronze this year and are using swimming as their physical recreation activity. It is hoped their expedition will take place this summer.

Guides and Senior Section have also contributed to various fundraising opportunities: the Children's Society at the Christingle Service; running a stall at the Church Advent Fayre and organising a Jumble sale to raise funds to improve the rear car park. The largest fundraising success was an application made to the Youth Opportunities Fund for the Garden Makeover project. ## Deanery Synod

During the year the Synod welcomed three presentations and discussed the following agenda items:

Revd Paul Kennedy, Diocesan Advisor on Healing, spoke about our understanding of healing and wholeness.

Tony Blackshaw, Diocesan Director of Education, Head of Mission and Education for the dioceses of Winchester and Portsmouth gave a talk on "How we can engage more fully and strategically with our local schools".

Revd Wendy Kennedy, the new diocesan secretary, emphasised her willingness to support parishes at grass roots level. She stressed that the diocese is not a separate entity but is holding matters in coming and in trust with and for all parishes within the diocese. She mentioned the new structure at Peninsular House and their striving for mission, outreach, education and social responsibility.

**Deanery pastoral committee and deanery plan:** The deanery plan is foundational for the future ministry in this deanery. It formally set up the three parish partnerships to explore new ways of working together across boundaries. The DPC has used the plan as a basis on which to advise the synod, bishop and archdeacon. Significant changes in relationships have happened within the parish partnerships and the plan has brought

with it a sense of enthusiasm and creativity. The DPC will be looking to the parish partnerships for grassroots views about any future developments in the deanery. By 2015 stipendiary posts should be reduced by 2.5.

**Kairos and Parish Partnerships:** The next phase of Kairos will be "buildings" which will start after Easter with selected deaneries. Parishes with long-term building plans would not be delayed by this process.

**West of Waterloo development:** Outline planning permission has been granted for about 500 houses on the border of the parish. An ecumenical group has been meeting for the past three years under the leadership of the archdeacon, to monitor the impact this development might have on the deanery. There are aspirations for a parish worker and a church school on the development (possibly incorporating a worship facility). Discussions are underway with Southwick parish to incorporate this new development into the parishes of Purbrook, Waterloo and Denmead.

**Good Communities Conference:** this deanery conference was held on 31<sup>st</sup> January 2008 at Havant art centre to engage with local communities. One hundred community delegates attended.

**Environmental Issues:** Al Gore's film, "An Inconvenient Truth" was given to all deanery clergy by Andy Norris, Diocesan Education Advisor.

**Koforidua:** The Rural Dean, Revd Paul Moore, expressed his thanks to all parishes who, to date, have generously donated £3680 towards the palm oil, building and stipend fund projects.

**Lambeth Conference:** This takes place from 11<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> July 2008. The deanery is asked to host 3 bishops and spouses. A deanery event is suggested for Sunday 13<sup>th</sup>.
